GRANTING PROGRAM LOGIC MODEL



Specific tasks and actions necessary to produce outputs. Activities should include who/what/ when/where/how detail.

e.g. Focus groups.
Series of discussions with local seniors to identify need, gaps in service and insights to inform toolkit development.

- Should be mapped onto the project schedule
- Activities are what project personnel "do" to achieve the project goals



## **OUTPUTS**

Project deliverables which are the direct result of activities. Outputs can be tangible (objects/products) or intangible (services).

e.g. Educational toolkit.
Print and/or digital versions
of the toolkit to be shared
with community service
organizations working with
older adults.

- Considered immediate, first-level results
- Success can be measured as soon as project is completed



## **OUTCOMES**

Changes or benefits for the target population from the use of outputs. Outcomes can also result directly from activities.

e.g. Service improvements.
Organizations report an
increased rate of
successfully referring older
adults to access local
support resources.

- Measurable change expressed as Who, What, When, Where and How
- Post-project change can be immediate or short/medium term



## **IMPACT**

Ultimate goal of the project, expressed as aspirational change at a societal and/or systemic level.

e.g. Healthier seniors.
Improved health metrics
among the older adult
population and stronger
connection between them
and their communities.

- Can be difficult but not impossible to measure and quantify
- Long-term vision that may take years to achieve, post project
